2021 Highlights-Winter

January 2021 began with limited open hours at all MPL branches. Customers were encouraged to use MPL To Go, the newly created curbside service, and to schedule appointments for computer use. Masks were still required for all customers and employees. Black History Month and Women's History

2021 Highlights-Spring

The second quarter of 2021 ushered in a gradual re-opening of MPL with the introduction of Grab & Go, which encouraged short visits to check out materials, use document services, and renew and register library cards. Customers shared photos of completed projects, like a braided denim chew toy for dogs; BSU Fraternity volunteers helped clean up the Maring-Hunt Library garden area; MPL celebrated National Library Week with special NLW programs and a proclamation issued by Muncie Mayor Dan Ridenour.















2021 Highlights-Summer

The Summer Reading Program (SRP) launched in June and continued through the month of July. Kids of all ages, and even adults, were encouraged to keep reading during the summer months and to attend

in-person and online programming.

Academic Enrichment at MPL: Ready Readers & Great Achievers

MPL Ready Readers (RR) is an early literacy program that provides free, one-on-one reading and vocabulary tutoring to children ages 1-9. Children learn and practice skills through different age-appropriate games and activities. RR is a unique early literacy program developed by



MPL employee Katie Lehman. The program focuses on the interests of the child to create an individualized learning approach. The program also includes parents and caregivers as part of the learning process. Ready Readers has been offered at Maring-Hunt Library since 2017, and several children "graduate" from the program each year as their skills reach age or grade levels of proficiency. Because of the program's success, there is generally a wait list to enroll, as the 50 available positions are filled quickly each year.

In 2021, Lehman applied for and was awarded a grant from the Dollar General Literacy Foundation to train community members as literacy tutors. This training has taken place, and now more literacy tutors will be

available to help children who are struggling to read or who need improved language and vocabulary skills. Additionally, after a feature article appeared in a statewide library publication, other public libraries throughout the state have reached out to MPL and Lehman to replicate the RR program to serve their own communities. *Photo: Katie Lehman, Ready Readers Supervisor at MPL, teaches early literacy tutoring methods to community volunteers*.

Great Achievers (GA) is the MPL afterschool program for students at South View Elementary. GA is a 21st Century Community Learning Center funded by the Department of Education. The program helps students at risk of academic failure through homework help, tutoring, and art and other creative activities. GA meets Mondays through Thursdays during the MCS academic year, with a summer enrichment program offered, as well. GA staff work closely with South View Elementary administration and teachers to identify students in need of extra academic support. GA staff walk with the students from the school to Maring-Hunt Library. At the end of the GA session, the children are




provided bus transportation home. The program provides nutritious snacks, one-on-one attention, and positive experiences for the students and their families. 


2021 Operating Revenue




2021 Operating Expenditures
