Tails and Tales Summer Reading

Believe it or not, summer is just around the corner... and for our Children's staff, summer means Summer Reading! And we are wild about this summer's theme of **Tails and Tales** because it is guaranteed to bring out



the tiger in you — or puppy, or monkey, or unicorn!

Here are the quick facts about Summer Reading 2021:

- ➤ Sign up begins May 1 on *Beanstack*, our online Reading Tracker website and mobile app. (https://chathamlib.beanstack.org.) For help using *Beanstack*, there is a simple tutorial on the right side of our website.
- ➤ There are challenges for every age group: (For children aged 8 or 12 choose the one challenge that best suits your child.)

Rubber Ducky Club for birth through age 3: Read 30 books together and receive a rubber ducky.

Summer Reading for ages 4-8: Receive prizes after each 100 minutes read.

Summer Reading for ages 8-12: Receive prizes after *each 150 minutes* read.

Tween/Teen Summer Reading for ages 12-18: Receive a virtual ticket to enter a raffle for a gift card of your choice after every book read and be automatically entered into a grand prize drawing.

- ► Read and redeem prizes between June 1 and July 31. Summer Reading ends Saturday, July 31.
- ► The last day to pick up prizes will be Tuesday, August 31.

Stories from the Stacks

Of all the things we missed last year, **Book Camp** might have been the one we missed the most. While we can't have Camp in quite the same way, we ARE offering a version of Book Camp this year. Introducing **BOOK CAMP IN A BAG!** When

you sign up for Book Camp this year, you will be able to receive all the camp crafts and activities along with the links to virtually join the Chatham Area Public Library Children's staff as we make crafts, play games, and hear stories together.

The Book Camp schedule is as follows:

Age 4 - Kindergarten - June 29, 30, and July 1

1st - 2nd graders - June 22, 23, 24

3rd - 4th graders – June 15, 16, 17

5th - 6th graders - June 21, 22, 23, 24

Camp will be on Zoom from 10:15 - 11:15 a.m. for campers age 4 - grade 4, and 1:00 - 2:00 p.m. for grades 5 - 6.

These grade levels are for the grade your child will be going into for the 2021-2022 school year. The cost for camp is \$5 (non-refundable). See our website and Facebook page for signup information beginning in May. Signup space is limited and registration is required.

Teen/Tween Crafts

June 9 – All Things Bright and Beautiful

by James Herriot (1973)

A Yorkshire veterinarian describes the adventures and experiences of his career as he tends to sick cattle, pregnant ewes, ailing dogs, and their eccentric owners, in a celebration of the relationships between humans and animals.

July 14 - The Lager Queen of Minnesota

by J. Ryan Stradal (2019)

A talented baker running a business out of a nursing home reconnects with her master brewer sister at the same time that her pregnant granddaughter launches an IPA brewpub.

August 11 - Founding Mothers

by Cokie Roberts (2004)

Intimate and illuminating look at the fervently patriotic and passionate women whose tireless pursuits on behalf of their families – and their country – proved just as crucial to the forging of a new nation as the rebellion that established it.

April 26 - The Warmth of Other Suns

by Isabel Wilkerson

Author Isabel Wilkerson chronicles one of the great untold stories of American history: the decades-long migration of black citizens who fled the South for northern and western cities, in search of a better life. From 1915 to 1970, this exodus of almost six million people changed the face of America.

May 24 - The Mountains Sing

by Phan Quể Mai Nguyễn

The multigenerational tale of the Trần family is set against the backdrop of the Việt Nam War. Trần Diệu Lan, who was born in 1920, was forced to flee her family farm with her six children during the Land Reform as the Communist government rose in the North. Years later in Hà Nội, her young granddaughter, Hương, comes of age as her parents and uncles head off down the Hồ Chí Minh Trail to fight in a conflict that will tear not just her beloved country but her family apart.

June 28 - The Book of Lost Names

by Kimberly Harmel

Escaping from Paris in 1942 after the arrest of her father, a Polish Jew, a graduate student finds refuge in a small town, where she forges identity documents to help hundreds of Jewish children flee the Nazis.

July 26 - The Feather Thief by Kirk Johnson

A talented American musician documents the astonishing 2009 theft of an invaluable collection of ornithological displays from the British Museum of Natural History, tracing the author's years-long investigation to track down the culprit and understand his motives, which were possibly linked to an obsession with the Victorian art of salmon fly-tying.

August 23 – Magpie Murders by Anthony Horowitz When editor Susan Ryeland is given the manuscript of Alan Conway's latest novel, she has no reason to think it will be much different from any of his others. Yes, there are dead bodies and a host of intriguing suspects, but the more Susan reads, the more she's convinced that there is another story hidden in the pages of the manuscript: one of real-life jealousy, greed, ruthless ambition, and murder.

April 19 – A Journey to the Center of the Earth by Jules Verne (1864)

An adventurous geology professor chances upon a manuscript in which a 16th-century explorer claims to have found a route to the earth's core.

May 17 - Gods of Jade and Shadow

by Silvia Moreno-Garcia (2019)

The Mayan god of death sends a young woman on a harrowing, life-changing journey in this one-of-a-kind fairy tale inspired by Mexican folklore.

June 21 – The Everything Box

by Richard Kadrey (2016)

A thief named Coop — a specialist in purloining magic objects — steals and delivers a small box to the mysterious client who engaged his services. Coop doesn't know that his latest job could be the end of him — and the rest of the world.

July 19 - The Bone Witch

by Rin Chupeco (2017)

Tea can raise the dead, but resurrection comes at a price... Her gift for necromancy means that she's a bone witch, a title that makes her feared and ostracized by her community. Tea puts all her energy into becoming an asha — one who can wield elemental magic. But dark forces are approaching quickly, and in the face of danger, Tea will have to overcome her obstacles...and make a powerful choice.

August 16 – The Invisible Life of Addie LaRue by V.E. Schwab (2020)

France, 1714: in a moment of desperation, a young woman makes a Faustian bargain to live forever and is cursed to be forgotten by everyone she meets. But everything changes when, after nearly 300 years, Addie stumbles across a young man in a hidden bookstore and he remembers her name.

Virtual Presentation Black Hawk's View of Illinois History

Thursday, June 17 at 6:00 p.m. Registration is required

Imagine sitting around a campfire with Ma-ka-tai-me-she-kiuk-kiuk, Black Hawk, listening to the stories of creation and the legends of his grandfathers. Storyteller and historian Brian "Fox" Ellis uses his family's personal history, the forced removal of the Cherokee Nation from their ancestral homeland along the Trail of Tears, and a deep knowledge of Native American history to bring the audience on a journey back to those dark days of American History with both humor and real insight, drawing strength from the resilience of the people. Weaving true history with folklore to create a tapestry of symbolic language, he draws the audience into the world view of this respected leader of his people. Celebrate the First Nations of Illinois and see the world through Native eyes.

2020 WAS ONE BOOKS!

With uncertainty all around in 2020, the Chatham Area Public Library was still the place people came - whether in person or online - to get answers, access credible information and to have fun.

As we closed our doors back in March 2020, we migrated quickly to enhance our digital services, boosted our Wi-Fi to be accessible outside our building, purchased more copies of eBooks, and started offering virtual events.

Our programs, which regularly saw packed rooms filled with smiling faces were suddenly virtual. Our programming Librarians worked hard to become video production experts: creating and delivering amazing content virtually including weekly trivia nights, storytimes and so much more. Hundreds of you watched and participated and we felt connected to our community despite the distance between us.

We found new and innovative ways to bring the Library into your homes, including developing a system for Curbside Holds Pickup which allowed us to safely provide access to our collection of physical materials in a no-contact way. Thousands of items have circulated through our system this way.

We also safely engaged with our patrons by utilizing our library grounds by creating an outdoor activity course, large window displays and monthly book walks.

We also took this time to rearrange our interior spaces in the Library. We utilized our current shelving to increase space for many of our most popular collections without spending additional dollars.

At the start of 2021, we were able to offer in-person browsing back to our collections. We look forward to additional service offerings throughout the year as we continue to adapt and shift in response to safety requirements and our community's needs. We will keep using our mission to guide us as we move forward through continued unprecedented times.
